The children were so well supported by their families, teachers, school team members, and friends. Their great encouragement and guidance shined - when the children won their events humbly, and lost their events proudly to have given their best.

This attitude speaks so highly of the whole-of-community nurturing and foundation that occurs in our small towns and surrounds. I am so grateful and proud for the time and effort that goes into the raising of our children by the families, teachers and school support staff, friends of the schools, and whole of community. Without this combined effort of setting a good example and a guiding hand, our children cannot reach their potential in their education and their life skills.

A big thank you to the school principals and their teams and the parents and friends for making sure that the Barcoo Sports happens every year. It is a big task to run the Barcoo Shire Sports day by the host school, and this year the Windorah State School with Principal Jenny Hughes and her staff making the day happen. A warm thank you to Peta Geiger for taking responsibility of organising and running the day with Principal Jenny Hughes away with her role in the Outback Advantage. As always, a grateful thank you to our Windorah P&C President, Tony Geiger and his supporters, and the Council staff members, particularly Brian Dayes - for preparing the oval for the day's events.

It is worth noting that two of our school principals (Jenny Hughes and Christine Volker) have been selected to be working with other experienced principals to provide the basis of the school curriculum into the future. This is a great honour to these two principals to be selected for this important role, and a testament to their commitment to remote education, and best outcomes for the children living in the regional and remote communities.

The importance of socialising children and exposing them to differing experiences like sports, the arts and literature, differing economic, social and environmental opinions can never be underestimated. I want to congratulate our schools, and their principals and support teams, for taking the time to encourage diversity in education, providing our children to the best possible educational experience, and the best chance at living and working in their chosen environment and chosen career.

I have always encouraged our children to respect diversity of culture and opinion and defend the principles of democracy and a free society. I also thought that children's' progression from primary school in a remote area to a large secondary school was as much part of the social education, as it was the progression through the education process from primary; to secondary; into a tertiary, trade based or TAFE pathway.

The importance of learning to live in a multicultural, multi-personality, multi-advantage, multi-belief, multi-gender or preference orientation can never be underestimated – because the world is all of this and more. If we are to succeed as a society, our children need to understand that difference is normal, and to have empathy for others around us who might not be the same as they are. It is so critically important that we as a society look out for each other, particularly people who are struggling with their own difference.

As all are aware – the Jundah Roadhouse and General Store is open. I have been over for a flash coffee with Matt and Shannon and Piper. It was great to see so many there, including their extended family, along with great and great great aunty and Barcoo Shire's most senior citizen, Cath Millar.

Every time I have been past the road house, the car park has been full of cars, and we have already enjoyed some beautiful catering courtesy of Matt and Shannon.

Last Friday, Queensland celebrated Police Remembrance Day. Below is an email I sent to our local Boys in Blue on behalf of the community - thanking them for their service and remembering their fallen colleagues and the families of those brave Police Officers.

Good afternoon Glen, Rob and Peter,

I wanted to let you know we in Barcoo Shire are thinking of you and your fellow Police Officers, and especially those fallen Police Officers, who have given their lives in the carrying out of their duty, on Police Remembrance Day.

We do appreciate everything you and the Queensland Police Service do in keeping our communities and citizens safe during times of need, and for protecting us from those who commit crime in our society.

It is a great thing to give your lives and careers to keeping people safe, and sometimes we do not show this appreciation in the deserving and respectful way in which we should. Police Officers put their lives on the line each and every day, work is sometimes in horrendous conditions, and are the frontline between the community and danger – thank you most sincerely for your commitment.

To all Police Officers, and to the families of those fallen Police Officer fellow colleagues – we say a warm and heartfelt thank you for your service, and our sympathy for your and these families' great loss.

The below loss of a Police Officer is close to us today on the anniversary of his death:

135 years since Constable Nathaniel Roberts of Windorah Police Station died after becoming lost in the bush without water near Connemarra Station, close to Windorah.

The Birdsville Races period of busy roads and busy towns seems to have gone off with no serious accidents. The volumes of traffic and people going to the Big Red Bash and Birdsville Races, and generally visiting the shire as tourists continues to increase year on year.

While this increase brings an economic boost to the towns and community groups along the way, the safety of the people travelling the roads during these big events is a big concern of Council and emergency services personnel. We are grateful to our local emergency services members, as well as the visiting Queensland Police Service officers, Queensland Fire and Emergency Services members and Queensland Ambulance Service paramedics who commit their time to keeping people safe.


We are starting to see driver attitude and lack of experience driving on remote roads becoming a serious problem. As vehicles get more comfortable and powerful, speed, impatience and driver fatigue becomes a major problem. As a result, we are seeing people taking unacceptable risks while passing oncoming traffic and slower vehicles going in the same direction. As the road deteriorates the further you go west towards Birdsville from Charleville and Longreach, we see this risk elevating as the road narrows and eventually becomes a gravel surface.

We are also seeing a differing dimension when it comes to substance abuse of drivers travelling to these events. The fact is, that there were considerably more drivers charged with drug driving than drink driving this year. Which probably should not come as a shock as society is using more and more recreational drugs – but we as other road users have a right to know that the vehicle coming toward us, has a person at the wheel that are fit to drive their vehicle.

The Windorah International Yabby Races were again a big success. The crowd was considered larger than usual, and most certainly the punters were paying considerably more on average for the racing yabbies. The Windorah Development Board and their yabby racing support team did a great job of organising the training of the yabbies, getting the form guide completed, all the preorganising, and the holding of this event on the night.

This is a joint community, and friends of the community effort, and there are too many to thank individually – but a big thank you to all involved. This event puts a considerable amount of money back into providing goods and services that benefit Windorah, which are available for all residents and visitors to enjoy, or add to the liveability of the town and surrounds.

Message From The Mayor—Budget Overview



Budget Overview

The 2019-20 Budget has been prepared with responsible fiscal management in mind and a full awareness of Council's current financial position. The major projects impacting on Council's bottom line this financial year will be flood recovery works and a plant replacement program, some of which has been held over from the 2018/19 financial year due to a lack of funding.

The 2019-20 Budget year will be no different to others, in that Council will be faced with having to exercise tight control over its spending. Whilst significant funding is expected for flood repair works, these monies will be targeted to specific projects. Council will still need to carefully monitor its general cash reserves in order to meet other capital obligations under the roadworks, plant replacement and asset renewal programs.

The annual increase in rates revenue has been limited to 2.5% for all categories. Council is cognisant of the economic times being experienced by ratepayers within the shire, and has sought to keep rate rises to a minimum while attempting to source government funding for projects where possible. In this vein, Council has been successful in attracting a pleasing amount of federal and state funding for a number of much-needed projects within the shire.

Some of these projects and the associated funding are set out in the project list below. A comprehensive list of all projects is set out within the budget papers.

Council has also reviewed the minimum charges for all rating categories as many of our services are unfunded and general rates subsidise these functions.

With these comments in mind I am pleased to report that for the 2019/20 financial year, initial figures show Council will generate a surplus of revenue over expenditure of \$2.6M.

At the end of June 2019, Council's accumulated funds, amounted to \$10.267M. However, this will be impacted this year with Council's commitment to projects that have either commenced or been funded with grants and matching revenue. In line with its general approach, Council has committed that if the supporting grant funding is not received, the projects will not progress, thus reducing the impact on our funds and providing for responsible management of our position.

Council is also mindful of the risk in carrying large debt, particularly when our own sourced revenue is low, and other revenue streams are subject to large variations in road works contracts and competitive government grants. We currently have one rural electrification loan of approximately

\$30.9K which is forecast to be repaid by 15 December 2021. Whilst there is opportunity for Council to borrow for large projects and spread this cost over the life of the asset, Council wishes to ensure these type of projects are funded from cash.

Council believes that we all have to live within our means, and whilst debt is a valid method of financing assets that have a future value and can be sold to realise that value, it is also passing on a debt to future councils and members of the community. Therefore there is significant support from Council to continually review our operations, and look towards doing our business more efficiently, so as to capitalise on some of these savings. With modern technology, communications, improved vehicle maintenance requirements and better opportunity to upskill our employees, there is


opportunity to save costs within our organisation through good management and good governance. It is incumbent on Council and senior management to ensure our staff has the skills and knowledge to support the vision of Council into the future.

We are looking forward to another progressive year for Council, but we must acknowledge that the opportune years of continued grant funding and Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements works are potentially receding, and we must look to other ways to fund our future.

This month's Recipe

Spiced Peach Chutney

(Christmas is fast approaching, so it's time to start gathering some delicious recipes)

"Sweet barbecued peaches and a load of lovely warm spices – this is a great chutney recipe"

Ingredients:

18 ripe peaches

2 fresh red chillies

3 red onions

1 large thumb-sized piece of ginger

1 bunch of fresh basil

1½ teaspoons cumin seeds

3 cloves

olive oil

250 ml cider vinegar

5 fresh bay leaves

300 g light brown sugar

sea salt

freshly ground black pepper



Method:

- 1. Preheat a barbecue or griddle pan until screaming hot. Meanwhile, halve and de-stone the peaches, then grill, cut-side up, for 3 to 4 minutes, or until the skin is charred and the fruit is starting to soften you may need to work in batches. Carefully lift off the grill and place skin-side up on a tray to cool. Once cool enough to handle, pinch off and discard the skins.
- 2. Prick the chillies with the tip of a knife and grill on all sides until blackened and blistered all over. Place in a mixing bowl, cover with cling film and leave to cool. Next, peel and finely chop the onion and ginger, then pick the basil leaves and finely chop the stalks. Place a large pan on a medium heat and add the cumin and cloves. Toast lightly for a few minutes, or until smelling fantastic, then tip into a pestle and mortar and bash to a powder. Place the pan back on the heat and add a splash of olive oil. Add the onion, ginger and basil stalks to a pan, cover with a lid and cook gently for 10 to 15 minutes, or until soft, sweet and sticky.
- 3. Meanwhile, carefully skin, deseed and finely chop the chillies (then wash your hands). Roughly chop the peaches and add to the pan along with the chillies, vinegar, bay, sugar, spices and a few tablespoons of water. Season with salt and pepper and bring to the boil. Reduce the heat and simmer gently for around 40 minutes, or until thick and jammy. Tear the basil leaves into the pan and stir together.
- 4. Remove from the heat and leave to cool, removing the bay leaves before serving.

JAMIE OLIVER'S TIP: If you're saving your chutney or giving it as a gift, you'll need to sterilise the jar first. Preheat the oven to 110°C/225°F/gas. Wash the jars in warm, clean, soapy water and pop upside-down on a clean baking tray. Place in the oven for 10 minutes, then use a clean cloth to take them out before filling them with the chutney and sealing them up.
